Throughout the projects the children have had a strong virtual link with the children in Lebanon through Skype. This face to face interaction between the pupils has promoted empathy and developed a bond between the children.



Through our partnership projects, we have encouraged the children to think about the difficult subject of conflict and peace. We felt that in today's current climate, with the war in Syria and Islamic terror threats being constantly in the news, it was essential the children should know about what is happening in the world and what better way than from children who have experienced it first-hand.
