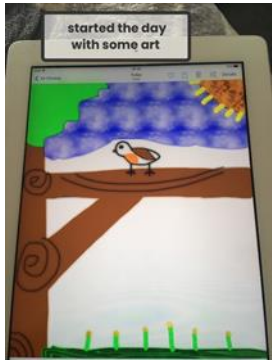

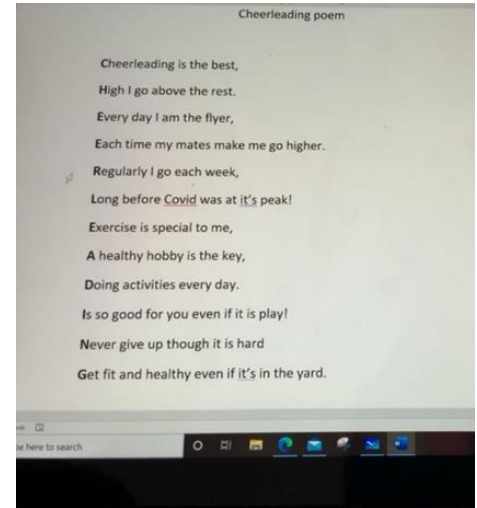

8. Because you have just got to concentrate on yourself and your own movements instead of your peers' movements.

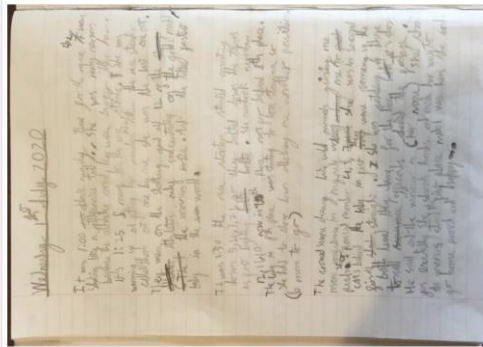
"Swoosh!" Meaning someone ran past her.
