

expected that pupils will study all six major world religions in depth during their time at Frances Olive Anderson Church of England Primary School, although they will have learning opportunities that allow them to encounter a range of religious worldviews. It is expected that pupils will also engage with non-religious worldviews, such as Humanism, as part of the RE curriculum. Our children's journey in RE starts in EYFS which is why our progression document begins here. The units from the Lincolnshire Agreed Syllabus and Understanding Christianity are both incorporated into the RE curriculum in Early Years. The ELGs reflected in this are 'Personal, Social and Emotional Development' and 'Understanding the World'. Children's learning is celebrated and recorded in a class floor book. Whole school policy with regards to SEND and adaptive teaching applies to RE. Teachers ensure that the learning activities employed in RE are adapted to meet a variety of learning needs. RE forms part of our commitment to provide a broad and balanced education to all children. Through our RE teaching, we provide learning opportunities that enable all pupils to make good progress. We strive to meet the needs of all pupils and we take all reasonable steps to achieve this.

Assessment

RE is assessed at the end of each unit through multiple choice quizzes. These results are then inputted into an assessment grid . We assess the curriculum as a model of progression, as opposed to assessing the pupils. We aim for 75% as a minimum expected for the class average, which links directly to the objectives used for planning. These objectives are taken from the Agreed Syllbus and Understanding Christianity. Teachers use their profesional judgement based on both oral and written responses; children are encouraged to know that there is no right and wrong answer in much of RE and their reflections play an important part in assessing their development.

Values:


Honesty: We believe that honesty is the foundation for trust in our relationships. We are brave and admit when we have made a mistake. We are reliable and responsible for our own actions.
